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Dive In!

Judith Albert, Nathalie Bissig, Pascale Birchler, Yvonne Christen Vagner, Moritz Hossli and Johanna Gschwend, Christian Kathriner, Nils Nova, Denis Twerenbold Jun 28, 2025-Jan 4, 2026 @Kunsthaus Zug

Dive in! Why not just switch off and flee the everyday hurly-burly? In turbulent times, that can sound very tempting indeed. The Kunsthaus Zug captures a current mood: from Jun 28, 2025 to Jan 4, 2026, it will present works by nine artists from Central Switzerland who are all united by the topic of immersion – but the exhibition goes far beyond mere escapism.

Waves roll onto the shore. Two tiny bathers can be seen at the bottom of the picture, playfully striding across the beach towards the sea. It's just a normal day at the seaside, you might think. But then the landscape begins to flow, as if it wanted to swallow up the bathers. Judith Albert's video work Côte de Granit Rose (2024) unleashes an eerie, poetic power to pull you in, setting the stage for our exhibition "Dive in!"

This exhibition features nine different artists from Central Switzerland whose works have one thing in common: Their immersive impact. The concept of "immersion", derived from the Latin "immersion", meaning to immerse or submerge, encompasses the process of being completely enveloped by an experience or a medium. In art, we talk about how the viewing public can be "immersed" in sensory worlds where the boundaries between observing and experiencing become increasingly fluid.

Nils Nova has accordingly designed the entire space assigned to him as a walk-in work of art. Wall-sized architectural photographs expand the real environment, while paintings with intense colors and multifaceted overlays create a powerful visual pull. Nova here deliberately plays with our perception - the exhibition space oscillates between reality and illusion, creating a sense of spatial disorientation.

Nathalie Bissig creates visual worlds that are inspired by local myths and legends. In her photographs in the series The Wolfes (2021–2024), she conceives gloomy landscapes populated by fantastic figures and mysterious objects. Her works prompt in us feelings of fascination and unease - as if we were part of a captivating story whose outcome remains uncertain.

In the works of **Yvonne Christen Vagner**, moss and stardust come together. Her *Mossboard III* (2019/2025) here comes face-to-face with photographs of supernovae. This juxtaposition opens up an immense epoch in which you can't help but lose yourself - stretching from the very origins of life (mosses are among the oldest plants) to the finitude of galaxies, as well as of our own "star".

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Pascale Birchler creates a melancholic scene in *Da sind wir, losgekettet von der Sonne* ("There we are, unchained from the Sun", 2022): a figure in knight's armour sits before an overcast, cloudy sky. The title refers back to Friedrich Nietzsche and thematises the forlornness and sense of disorientation felt by human beings since the loss of metaphysical certainties.

The work of **Moritz Hossli** is also uncanny in mood: his 3D-video work *Stereo Kinematica* (2018) depicts a walk through dark woodlands. There are moments when it seems as if we are reminded of those trials that fairy-tale characters have to endure in gloomy forests. It is a place that eludes our grasp, situated between memory and simulation and seeming to hover in an in-between world. This state of "floating" continues in Hossli's joint work with **Johanna Gschwend** called *Schwarm* (Swarm, 2016) that depicts a flock of birds silently circling in waves along the horizon — between lush green meadows and the autumn forest beyond. It is a never-ending moment of taking off and flying away.

Denis Twerenbold works with reduced means and intense atmospheres. In his video work aesculus (2020), the camera observes in real time how the substance aesculin emerges from the branch of a chestnut tree and begins to glow blue under UV light. This gradual transformation has an almost hypnotic effect that blurs the boundaries between mere observation and intense, real experience.

Christian Kathriner's large-format paintings have an equally intense impact. He made them in an experimental process, and his canvases completely absorb the viewer. His work *Grecs inconnus* ("Unknown Greeks") plays with the topics of remembering and forgetting. Here, Ancient Greece – the cradle of Western civilisation – confronts us in the form of portraits of Greeks who are unknown today. Like other pieces in this exhibition, this work enables us to experience how "diving in" can also mean disappearing – a dissolution of the individual in time and space.

The worlds that open up to us in this exhibition go beyond any mere escapism. They lead the observer to the mysterious, the unsettling and the incomprehensible. Or, to put it another way: it is only when we are "seized" by what we see that we are able to comprehend it. The boundary between viewing and experiencing is then dissolved – and we find ourselves not standing before the artwork, but immersed in the very midst of it.
